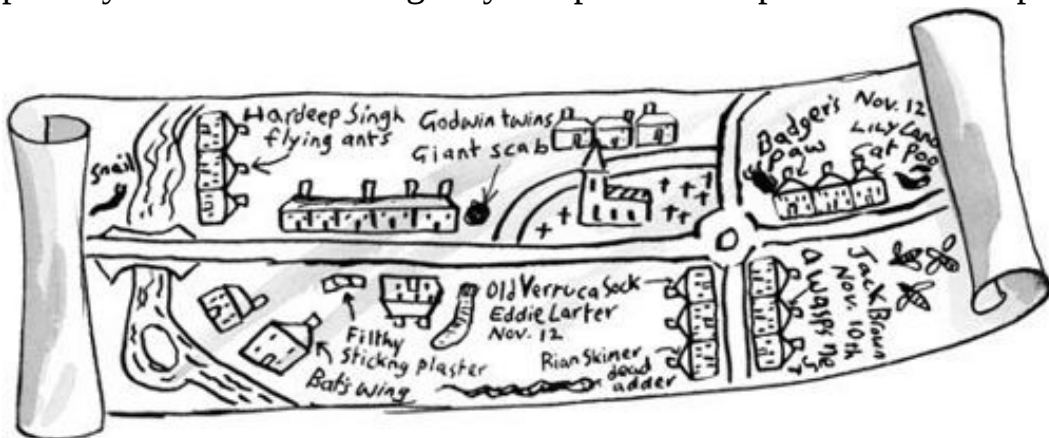

- I waited and waited but the bus never turned up (an oldie but a goodie).



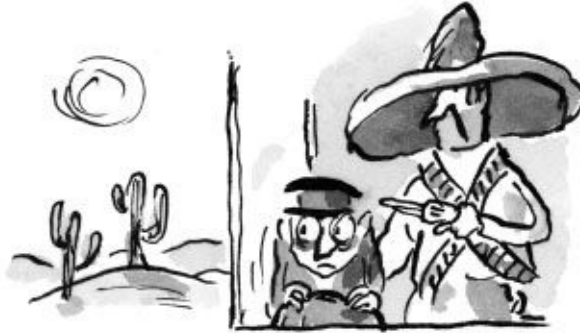
- I got on the wrong bus, one which was actually being used by a motorcycle display team to jump over.

The candlelight flickered in the dark, but there was enough light to see that Dad was upset. He reached out for his son’s hand.

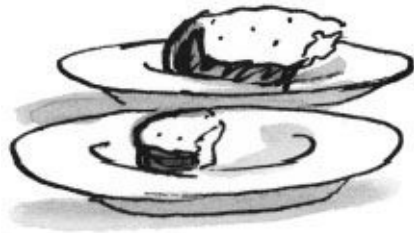
“Pup, you’d tell me if there was something wrong, wouldn’t you?”

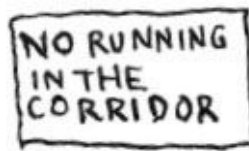

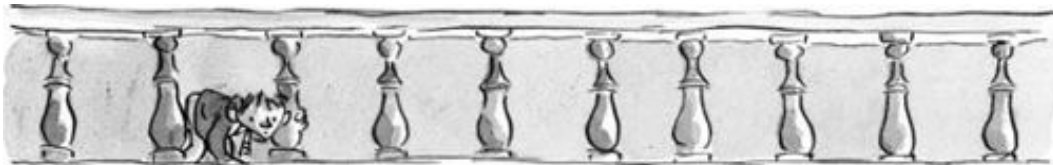

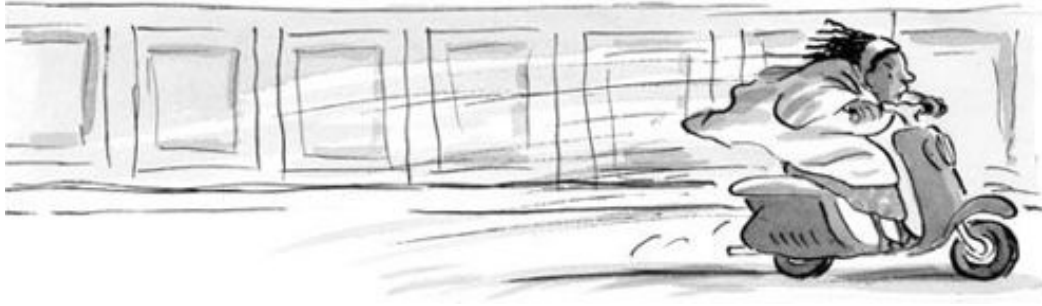
Alfie belted past a sign that read:

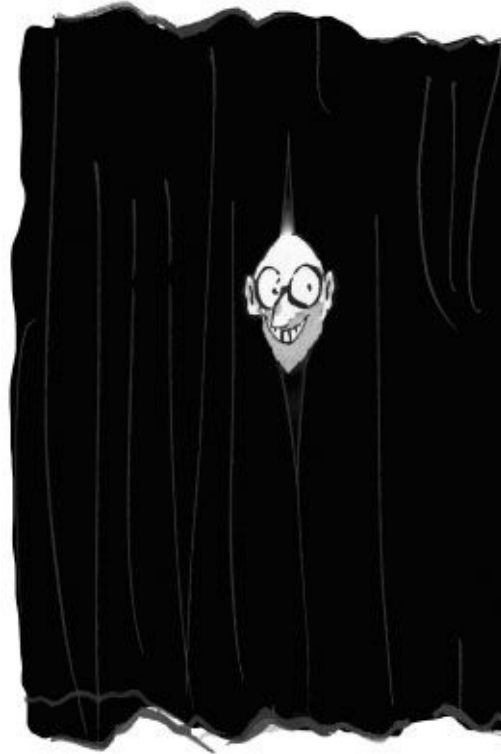
He leaped to his left. Darn. The stupid language lab door was locked. Still the moped was coming straight towards him. He leaped to the right and turned the handle.

gently. The noise made her face light up with joy.

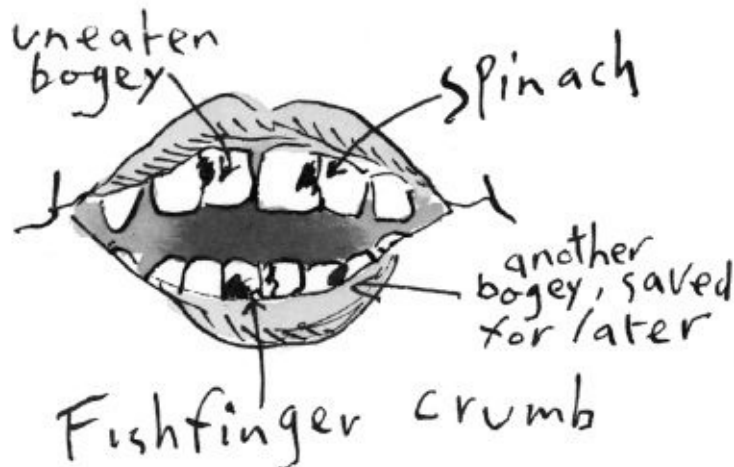

“Your tooth...”

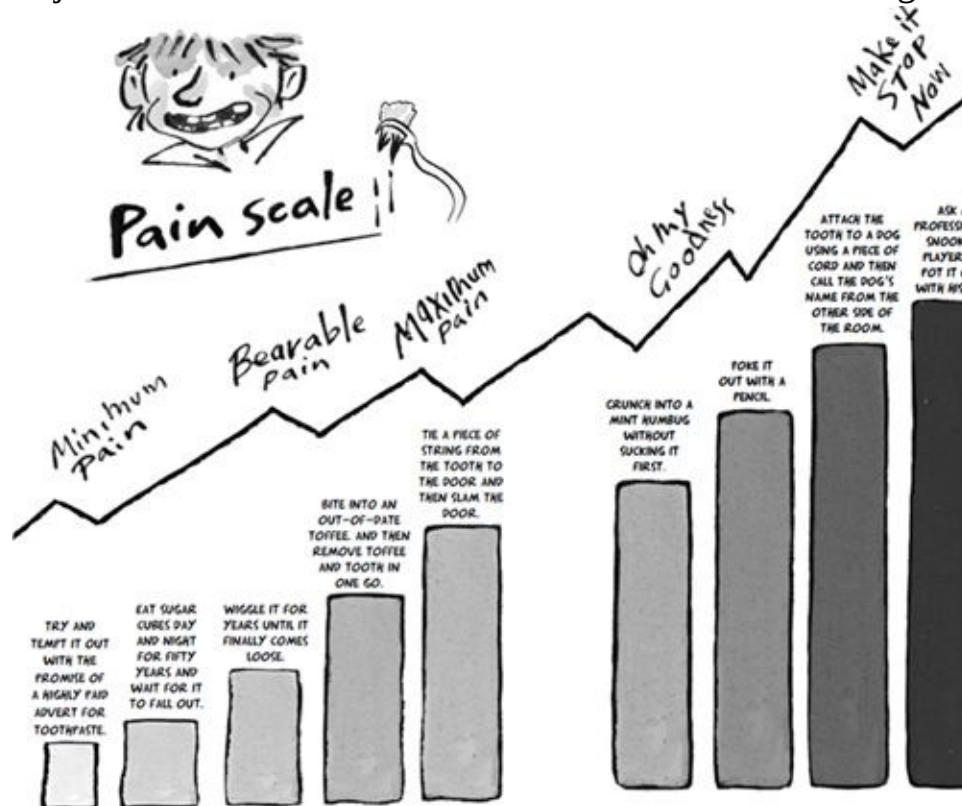
Raj looked more than a little panicked, and slowly approached Alfie.

With that she bustled past Alfie. In her job as a social worker, Winnie was well-practised in people not wanting her around.

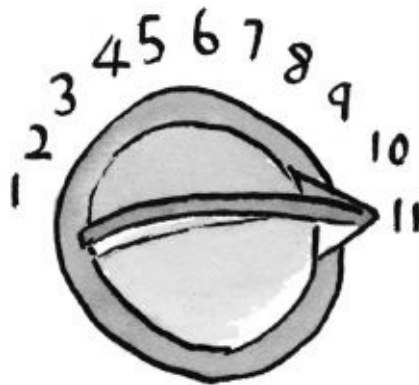
Busybody.

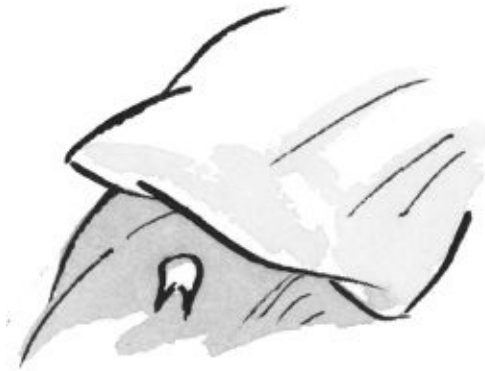


With the social worker gone, Alfie was out of trouble. For now. But the boy was about to step into a world more dangerous than he could ever imagine...

The Darkest Hour

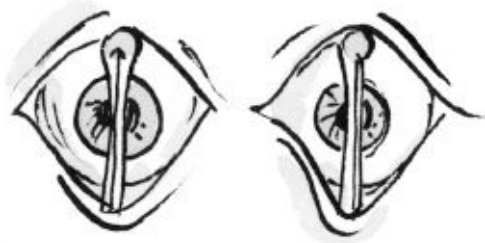
The plan was under way...

He was going to have to face this monster alone.

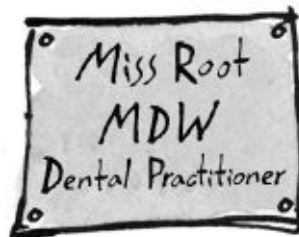
Out of the Fog

“No, no, it’s me!” he said, drawing closer. “I am here to rescue you!”

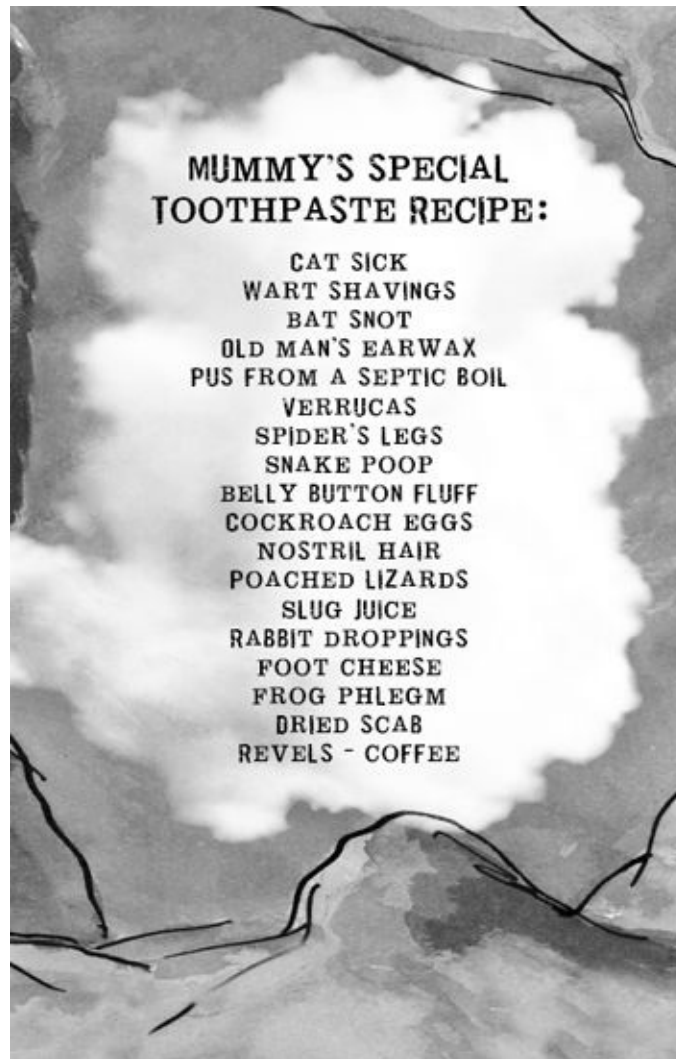
“Well, you took your time!” she replied.

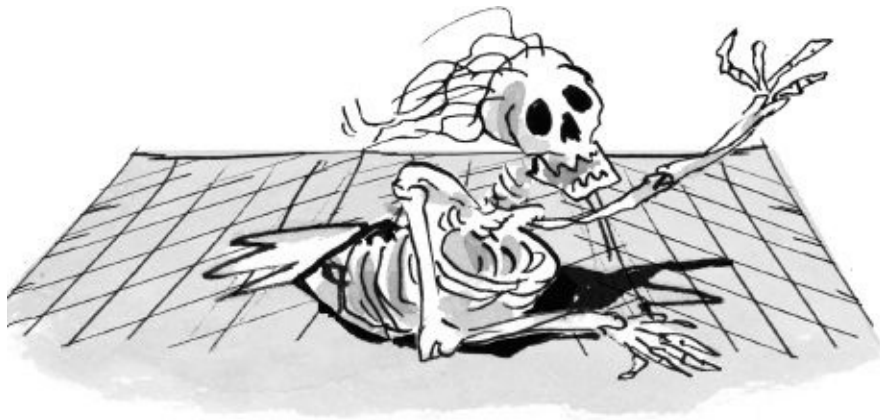
“How did you get the lift working?” pleaded Alfie.

In his head, Alfie could hear Dad’s voice.

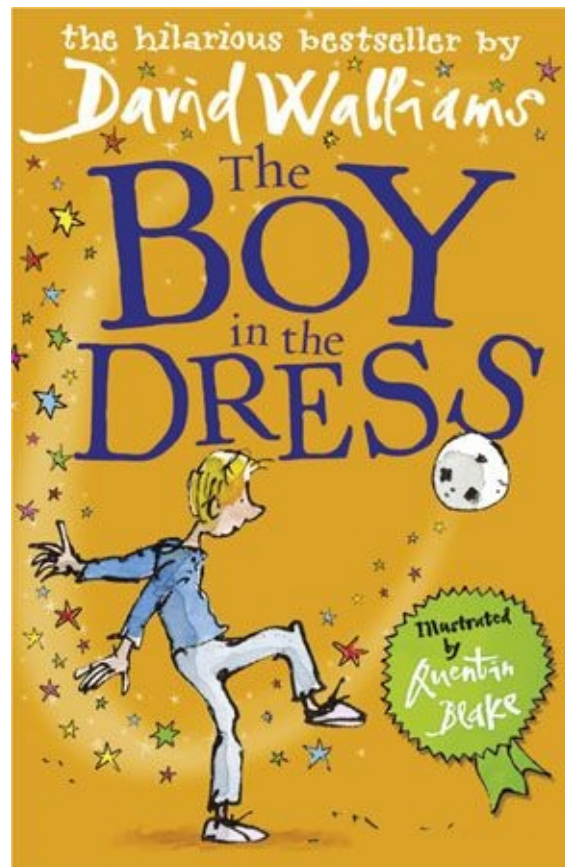
