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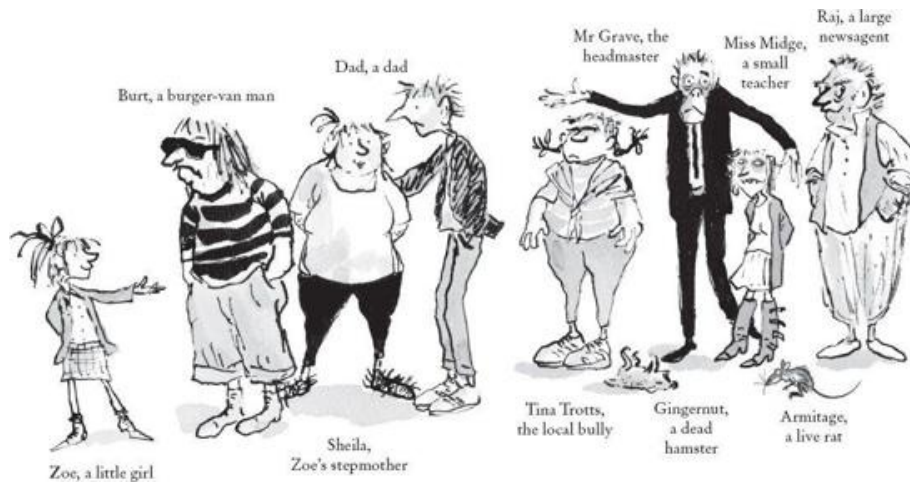

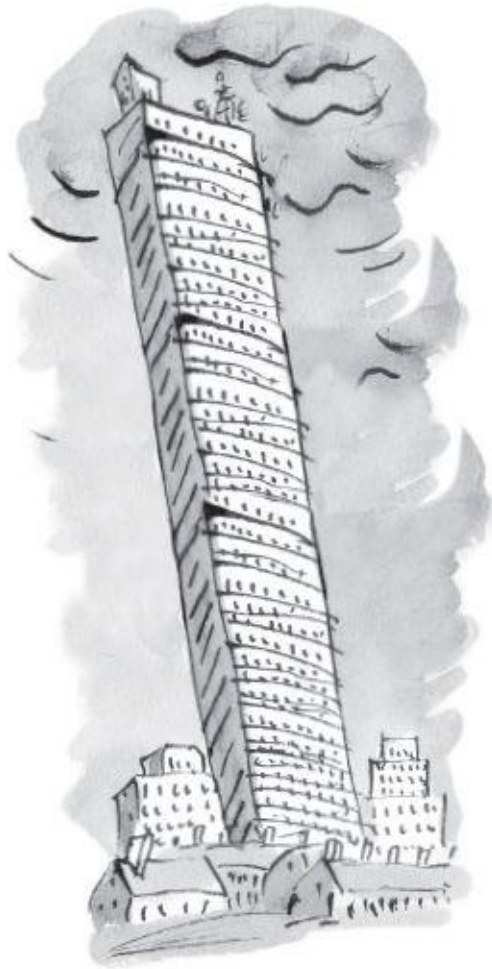

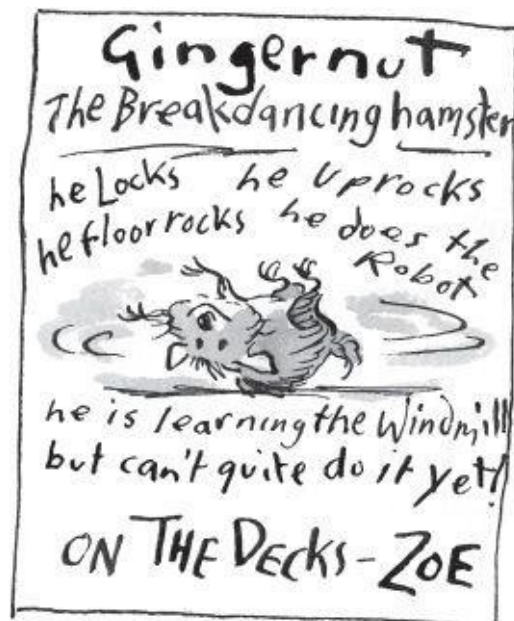
In short, Zoe loved Gingernut. And Gingernut loved Zoe.

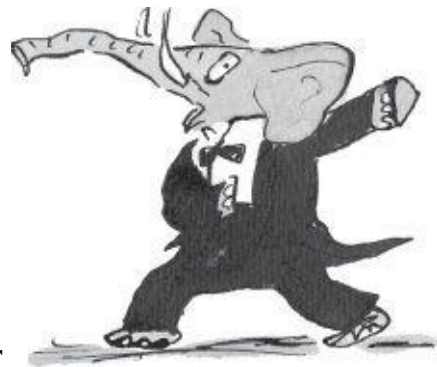
A frog who is a superstar DJ

A ballet-dancing pig



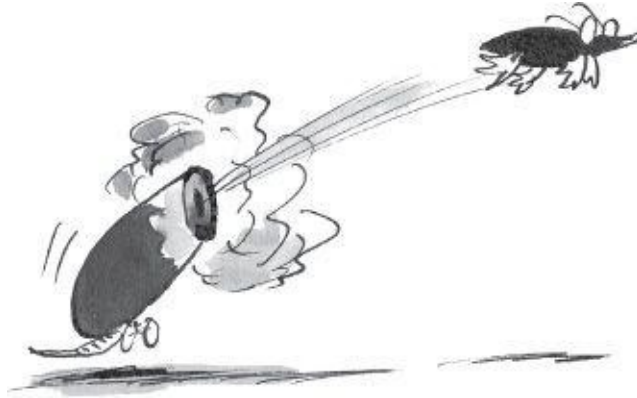
A worm hypnotist

"Of course not."

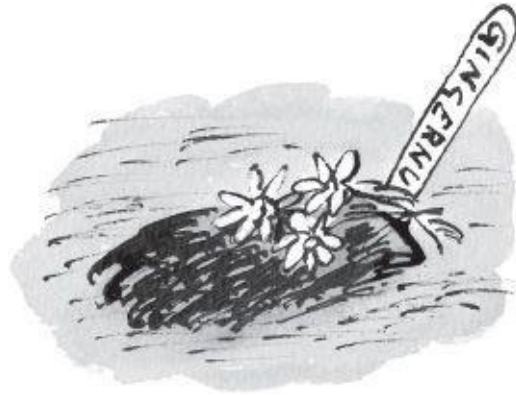
Zoe knelt down beside him, picked up the little package and lowered Gingernut into the small hole her father had dug.

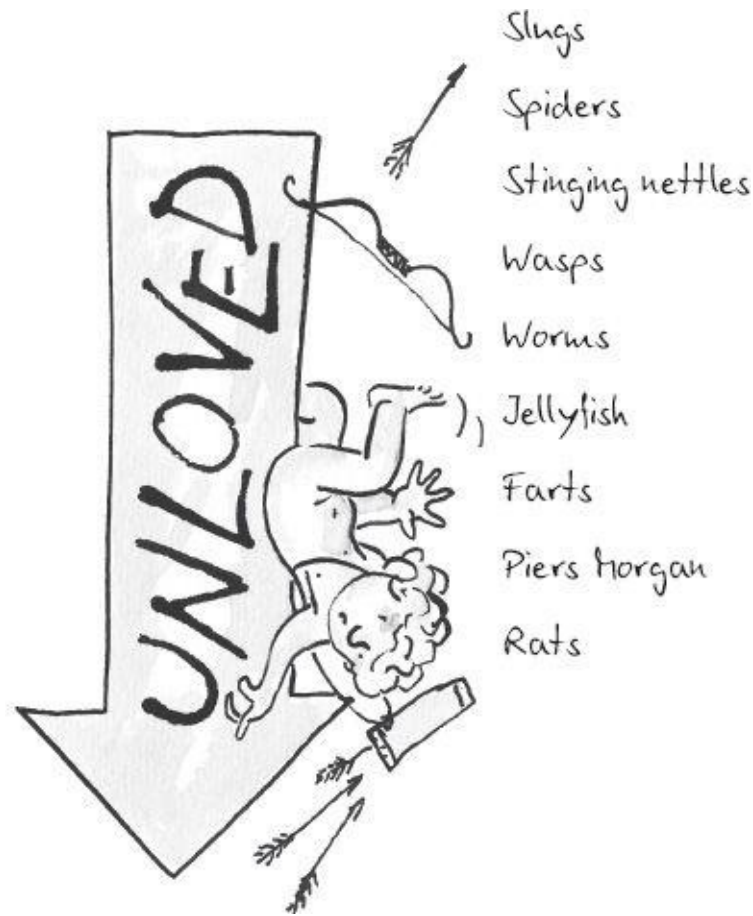

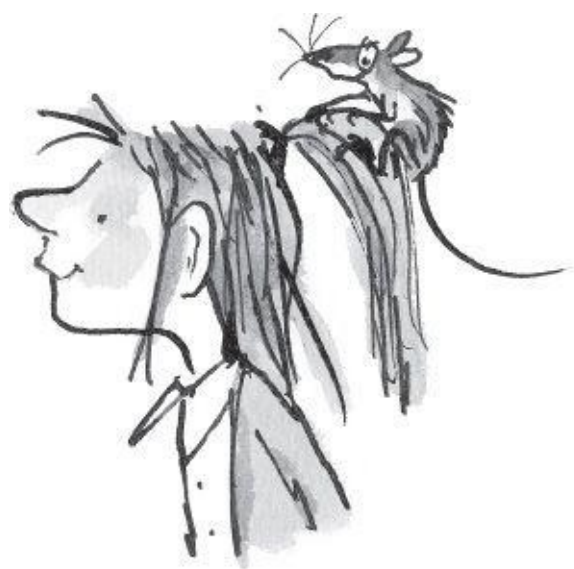

During a football match you run around kissing all your team-mates after you have scored a goal, only to be told by the PE teacher that it was, in fact, an own goal?

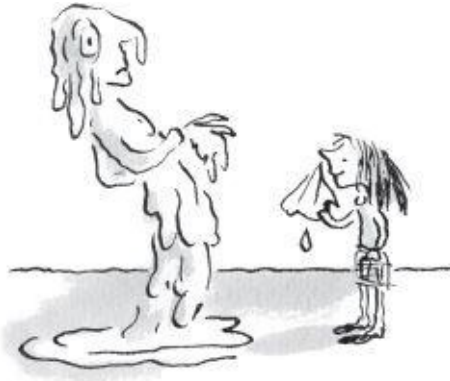


You trace your family tree in a History class and you find out you are related

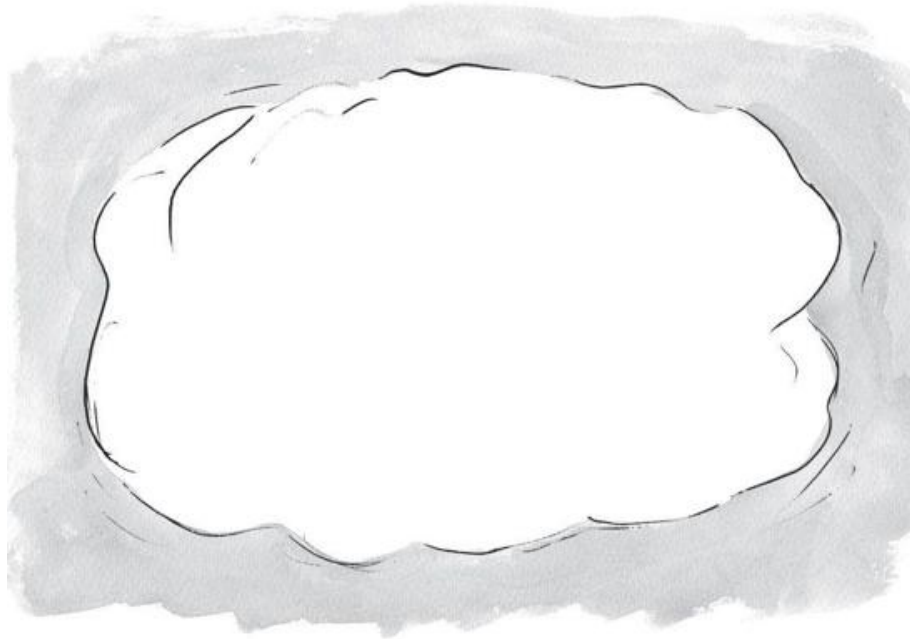

But behind her, Tina and Sheila's furious faces were pressed up against the glass, and they were banging on the window.

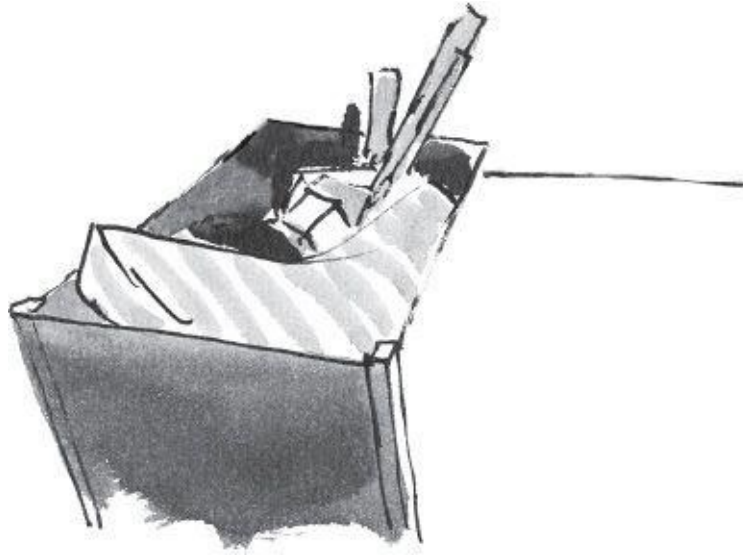

Beside the cages was a tank of cockroaches, with a sticker that simply read 'Ketchup'.

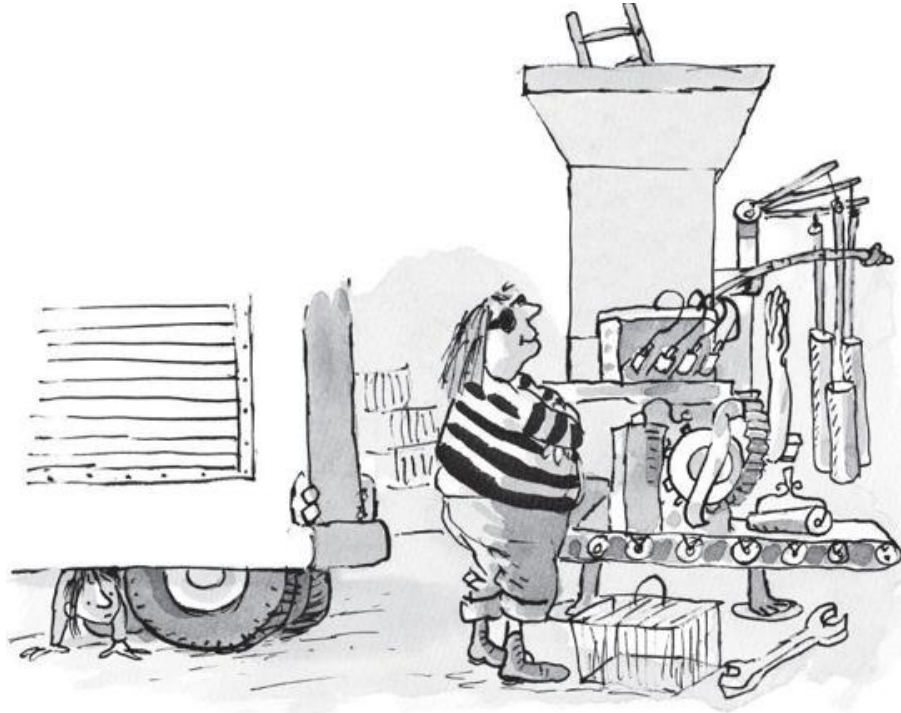
I'm so glad I never ate one of Burt's burgers, thought Zoe. Even so, she still felt really sick.

Zoe started unwinding the pieces of metal wire that kept the cages locked. I say cages – they were really old deep-fat fryers.



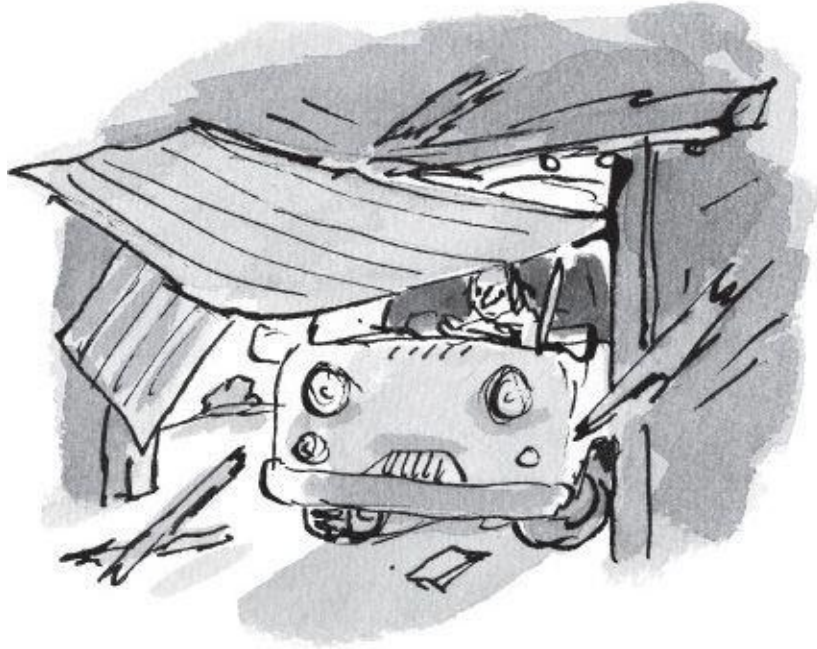
“How are you getting on?” said Dad.
